

#### **BRUCE'S GARDENING CORNER**

Winter will be here shortly. It is a good time to think ahead for next planting season. What crops grew best for you and how can you improve their production?

Learn all you can by reading! Even your seed catalogues have an immense store of information in their seed descriptions.

If you have seeds left over, just keep/store them and here is how. Get some powdered milk and mix 1 part powder with 1 part seed (1 kind of seed only). Put powdered milk and seeds in a re-sealable bag, squeeze out the air and close the top tightly. Now label the bag with the year and seed type. Find an out of the way spot in the refrigerator (not freezer) to store it until spring. The powdered milk will keep your seeds dry and fresh all winter long. Most vegetable and annual flower seeds remain useable for two to three years—some longer. Be kind and be healthy ~ \*Bruce\*





AS TIME GOES BY...A Monthly Commentary on Local and Other Events of Historical Interest and Note....by David Rutstein

#### The Worst of the Worst Winter

"Blizzard Was King"... "The Metropolis Helpless Under Snow"..."Hardly A Wheel Turns"... the banner front page headlines read. Does this sound like one of our Berkshire winter snow storms? Wrong! These are contemporary news accounts from the New York *Sun* of March 13, 1888 announcing blizzard conditions that have arrived in the northeast.

With another winter on its way and with our quirky weather system, will this happen again? Who knows?

Paul Ivory, present chairman of the Gt. Barrington Historical Commission, in the Gt. Barrington Historical Society Winter newsletter of 1983, described perfectly this blizzard and its effect on our town. The blizzard of 1888 shut down Gt. Barrington with winds howling of up to 70 miles per hour and snow drifts 10-30 feet high wreaking havoc everywhere. Downtown looked like a ghost town with Main street deserted of animals and people. One example of the power of this storm was the significant amount of snow covering a coal scale at the Burgett & Lewis Store at the corner of Castle and Main streets with the accumulation of snow weighing 2,700 pounds!

Berkshire railway lines became impassable with passenger cars just stuck and stranded with the blizzard roaring around these immovable objects. A theatrical group travelling by rail from Danbury, CT to Gt. Barrington, was forced to burn outside fencing to keep themselves from freezing until being rescued the next day. Residents of Gt. Barrington had to get through drifts up to their armpits to get from the front door to the street.

By Wednesday of March 14, the storm was over and the good folks here began to dig themselves out. With shoveling on Main Street (no internal combustion engine vehicles in those days) adding to the very high snow mounds, it became almost impossible to cross the street. Teams of horses pulling wagons carried the snow from Main and Railroad Street and dumped it into the Housatonic River. Let's hope that another such winter catastrophe is not a plausibility for the 2014-15 winter season. Florida, here we come!
